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Join the Refill Revolution

The "Refill Revolution" is a movement to change disposable America's mindset and stop the negative impacts our throw-away behavior has resources. the environment, and the health of living things. To achieve this goal, we need only to apply these simple strategies:

a refillable Use water bottle:

Americans u s e approximately 50 billion water bottles per year and only 23% of those bottles actually recycled. It makes good environmental sense to invest in a refillable bottle avert this waste.

Shop with reusable tote bag.

Americans consume nearly 100 billion plastic shopping bags per year and only 3% of these bags get recycled. Whether shopping for groceries or other merchandise, refilling your reusable tote bag will help prevent this waste.

Use travel

Americans throw away 25 billion Styrofoam™ coffee cups every year and most communities have infrastructure for recycling this material. Refilling your travel mug is practical option to reduce this non-recyclable waste.

If you choose to join the "Refill Revolution", you will not be alone. For the past four years, program has been successfully implemented at the Bonnaroo Music Festival, producing impressive results. date, an estimated 2 million plastic cups and bottles were water diverted from the landfill through this waste prevention program.

Its time to become part of the solution and join the "Refill Revolution." The planet is depending on you.

Food Waste Warriors



Students at Damascus Elementary School have long been known as "West Branch Warriors," but now they can be known as "Food Waste Warriors" too.

When Damascus Elementary School implemented its Food Waste Prevention Program in November, no one was sure what to expect. Now the results are in and everyone agrees that the program is a success.

By utilizing a sharing table in the cafeteria, the school was able to collect 938 pounds of surplus food and donate it to local food pantries. By utilizing a backyard compost bin, the school was able to compost 263 pounds pre-consumer food

waste on site. These activities combined allowed 1,201 pounds of food to be diverted from the waste stream and put to good use.

Congratulations are extended to Damascus Elementary School for taking on this special project. They have truly earned their new title as "Food Waste Warriors."

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Mahoning County Schools Earn High Marks for Recycling Cans

Congratulations are in order for several Mahoning County schools in recognition of their exemplary recycling efforts. In the county-wide "Cash for Cans" contest, numbers are quite impressive. Fifteen participating schools collected a total of 6,933 pounds of beverage cans earning \$2,773.20. The breakdown is as follows:

These schools will receive checks for the market value of the cans along with framed Award Certificates.


